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
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# Editor-in-Chief's Foreword

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# PRECISION IN ACTION

Behind the RBAF Arena Demonstration


nder the blistering sun and amid eager anticipation, the Royal Brunei Armed Forces delivered a standout highlight of the 64th Anniversary celebrations — the Arena Demonstration. Behind the flawless execution on 31st May and 1st June 2025 were weeks of preparation, teamwork, and joint-force integration across land, sea, and air.

A total of nine rehearsals were conducted before the main event, each iteration sharpening the choreography between air, sea, and land components. The demonsration simulated the interdiction of a hostile vessel in Brunei's maritime domain and featured a seamless blend of assets from across the RBAF.

The Special Forces Regiment's Maritime Squadron executed a fast-paced boat insertion, while their Combat Squadron snipers provided overwatch from an S-70i Blackhawk helicopter from No.3 Wing of the Royal Brunei Air Force. At sea, the Naval Surface Action Group (NAVSAG) personnel performed an air insertion onto the vessel, complemented by KDB MUSTAED's interdiction role. The Combat Boat Squadron from the

Royal Brunei Land Force secured the safety cordon, while the Combat Engineering Squadron handled explosives rigging. Support also came from external partners, with PTAS AMANAH playing the role of the 'critical contact of interest' during rehearsals and the first day, followed by KDB TERABAN on the second.

Key leadership ensured smooth execution: Lieutenant Commander Awg Md Hasmalie bin Awg Hj Ahmad, RBN, served as Second-in-Command, while Lieutenant Commander Ahmad Zubair bin Abd Nasir RBN, managed on-ground movement. In total, 31 assets, 156 personnel, and 28 support staff worked in unison.

The event drew large crowds, offering a rare glimpse into the RBAF's operational capability. More than a display of tactics, the Arena Demonstration was a powerful testament to unity, professionalism, and the spirit of service.

## Royal Brunei Navy Welcomes Its 15th Commander

n a proud moment steeped in tradition, unity, and reflection, the Royal Brunei Navy (RBN) witnessed a historic Change of Command Parade at Muara Naval Base on 10 January 2025. The ceremony marked the official handover of duties from Captain Haji Mohamad Sarif Pudin bin Matserudin, RBN, to Captain Sahibul Bahari bin Haji Zainal Abidin, RBN — becoming the Navy's 15th Commander.

Officers, personnel, civilian staff, and invited guests gathered in formation, saluting both the legacy of the outgoing Acting Commander and the future vision set by the new leadership. More than just ceremonial, the occasion reflected the evolving journey of the RBN — an institution built on the foundations of professionalism, teamwork, and service to the nation.

In his heartfelt farewell address, Captain Haji Mohd Sarif Pudin, RBN, looked back on his time at the helm — a tenure of 2 years and 9 days, defined by growth, operational readiness, and shared accomplishments. He proudly highlighted milestones that strengthened the Navy's core priorities: To Float, To Move, and To Fight.

Beyond these tangible milestones, Captain Haji Mohd Sarif Pudin, RBN, credited RBN's steady progress to its people — the men and women of the Navy, their families, and the vital civilian support agencies working tirelessly behind the scenes.

"Everything we achieved was possible because of the unity, dedication, and unwavering spirit of our team," he shared, thanking personnel across ranks for their commitment to the Navy's mission. Among those significant accomplishments were:

- The commissioning of the AS-SIDDIQ Class Patrol Vessels — KDB AS-SIDDIQ and KDB AL-FARUQ
- The launching of new officer training courses, including the Intermediate Navigation Officer Course, Naval Engineering Officer Course, and Base Defence Officer Course all designed to empower the next generation of leaders
- Expansion of the Sub-Lieutenant Course, now open to regional navies. To date, officers from Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia, and the Philippines have taken part in the course
- Integration of Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) and the establishment of the Fleet Tactical Aircraft Squadron (FTAS)
- The successful MM40 missile firing of 3 salvos at the prestigious Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC) Exercise, held at the island of Hawai'i, United States of America
- Completion of Exercise BLUE TOMBAK, Fleet Concentration Period, and the installation of the MSI 20mm Seahawk gun system aboard KDB MUSTAED

MDEX Asia 2025 returned to Singapore, drawing thousands of visitors, advanced technology displays, and navies from across the Indo-Pacific. The Royal Brunei Navy (RBN) was among them, reaffirming Brunei's enduring role as a regional maritime partner.

Diplomacy at the Core – The Royal Brunei Navy's consistent participation in multilateral engagements reflects its steadfast commitment to regional cooperation, trust-building, and ASEAN solidarity.

hosted one of the region's largest maritime engagements as navies from across the Indo-Pacific gathered for Multilateral Naval Exercise KOMODO (MNEK) and the International Maritime Security Symposium (IMSS) 2025.

#### **RBN In The Mix**

Commander RBN, Captain Sahibul Bahari bin Haji Zainal Abidin, RBN, led the Brunei delegation with his spouse, RBN officers and the Defence Attaché to Indonesia, Commander Muhd Shahmun Azimin bin Haji Awg Asli, RBN. Lieutenant Commander Mohammad Aliashim bin Alias, RBN, and Lieutenant Commander Mohammed Aiezuddin bin Julaini, RBN, attended as official observers.

#### At Sea: The Spectacle

The International Fleet Review turned the Bali Strait into a parade ground. A broad line of participating ships wheeled past the reviewing ship, KRI dr. Radjiman Wedyodiningrat, national ensigns snapping and signal flags aloft. Overhead, maritime aircraft traced the formation, while decks were manned and salutes exchanged modern steel set against a very old naval ritual. RBN representatives embarked on the host platform to observe the choreography up close, taking in the communications,

that make a multinational sail-past look effortless.

#### On Shore: The Thinking

Running in parallel, the International Maritime Security Symposium (IMSS) gathered naval leaders, policy thinkers and technologists under the theme "Addressing Maritime Security Challenges with Technology and Cooperation." Conversations dug station-keeping and safety drills into surveillance and domain awareness, smarter informationsharing and the nuts and bolts of interoperability.

#### **Side Conversations That Count**

Between sea serials and symposium sessions, Captain Sahibul Bahari sat down with regional counterparts to turn handshakes into homework. The

talks circled practicals: extra slots on courses and exercises, crossdeck visits for junior officers, HADR and maritime-safety coordination, and cleaner information-sharing for day-to-day awareness. There was interest in comms compatibility, simple track-reporting norms, and port-call cooperation—small, workable steps that add up to smoother operations the next time ships meet at sea.

#### Why It Matters for the RBN

For the RBN, engagements like this translate directly into sharper day-to-day operations. Observer billets and deck visits turn into takeaways—cleaner practical comms procedures, tighter stationkeeping, clearer reporting norms so mixed formations feel familiar the next time our ships meet at sea. The conversations also open doors: extra slots on regional courses and exercises, cross-deck time for junior officers and technicians, and faster points-of-contact for port calls, logistics and HADR coordination. Just as important is the people piece: professional networks built in Bali make information-sharing quicker and trust stronger when it matters. In short, MNEK and IMSS help a small navy punch above its weight—by staying connected, interoperable and ready alongside trusted partners.

# Beyond the Ledger RBN Officer Sharpens Supply Chain Expertise

n naval operations, logistics often works behind the scenes — vital but unseen. For 908 Lieutenant Commander Mohammad Lugman bin Haji Abd Hamid, RBN, this critical domain took centre stage during a five-week immersion in the Royal Malaysian Navy's (RMN) Supply Officer Advanced Course (SOAC) 09/2024.

Held at KD Sultan Idris I in Lumut, Malaysia, the course brought together regional logistics specialists to deepen their understanding of defence acquisition, joint logistics planning, and strategic supply chain management. "It's not only the technical knowledge," Lieutenant Commander Lugman, RBN, shared. "The experience challenged how we think about integration — how we, as supply officers, are expected to enable operations beyond our own silos."

Aligned with Level 5 competency standards, the course blended theory with practical application. Experts from the National Defence University of Malaysia and the Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport (CILT) Malaysia led sessions on financial tools and procurement strategies — all aimed at preparing supply officers for today's dynamic defence environment.

A standout moment was a lecture by Rear Admiral Dr. Azizi bin Hj Ahmad Sarkawi, Assistant Chief of Staff (Materiel), RMN, who emphasised that beyond technical skill, integrity, teamwork, and attitude are essential.

SOAC also required participants to conduct independent research on real-world logistics challenges, presenting formal assessments graded by CILT Malaysia — a step toward further professional certification.

The course culminated in the CILTM Convocation Ceremony 2024, held at the Grand Shah Alam Convention Centre (SACC). It was a formal but celebratory occasion, marking the accomplishments of officers who had juggled analytical rigour, peer collaboration, and operational context to earn recognition from one of Malaysia's most respected professional bodies in logistics and transport.

For Lieutenant Commander Lugman, RBN, the course was not just a career milestone - it was a reaffirmation of the crucial but often invisible work supply officers perform. "We may not always be in the headlines," he said with a smile, "but without logistics, nothing moves, and nothing fights."

## Life as a Female Officer in the Royal Brunei Navy

From a young age, Lieutenant Commander Nazurah binti Haji Mahaleh, RBN was no stranger to naval life. As the daughter of a former Royal Brunei Navy (RBN) officer, she grew up surrounded by the rhythm of the base. One memory from the mid-90s remains etched in her mind — standing at the RBN Headquarters, looking out at the ships berthed at Jetty Alpha, their dressing flags fluttering proudly in the sea breeze. Her father had brought her to the office, unable to leave her home alone while he carried out his duties. It was there, as a young primary school student peering through those windows, that a quiet dream took root: to one day wear the uniform and serve her nation at sea.

Though initially intending to enlist after her GCE O-Level, she chose to further her education and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Primary Education from Universiti Brunei Darussalam (UBD). Yet the call to serve remained. In 2009, she joined Officer Cadet School (OCS) Intake 3 and was commissioned as an officer at the age of 25, marking the beginning of her naval career forged through grit and perseverance.

Upon joining the RBN, Lieutenant Commander Nazurah , RBN expected to serve in a shore-based role. However, 2010 marked a historic shift in the RBN with the integration of female officers onboard ships, beginning with the newly commissioned Fast Patrol Boats (FPB) dubbed the IJHTIHAD-Class. Without hesitation, she embraced the opportunity and stepped into the uncharted waters.

Alongside her fellow pioneers and squadmates – Lieutenant Commander Suzalina binti Serbini, RBN, Lieutenant Commander Dk Lyadia Ulandari binti Pg Muhammad, RBN, and Lieutenant Commander Hidayatul Zabidah binti Haji Dayang, RBN – they underwent rigorous training identical to her male counterparts and were deployed to sea within the same year.

She fondly recalls her early deployments, including Exercise HORNBILL 20/10 at Sepanggar Naval Base, Kota Kinabalu, Malaysia, in 2010, and Exercise Helang Laut 12B/10 at Semarang, Republic of Indonesia – formative experiences that shaped her operational foundation and confidence as a naval officer.

Her determination and performance led to a momentous milestone: in 2016, she was appointed as the first female Commanding Officer of KDB MUSTAED, a Fast Interceptor

Boat (FIB). Six years later, she once again made history by taking command of KDB SYAFAAT, an FPB, which is a testament to her leadership, resilience, and operational excellence.

But being a pioneer comes with challenges. "The real challenge is always me vs me," she shares, highlighting the importance of personal discipline, mental strength, and self-reflection in command. For Lieutenant Commander Nazurah, RBN, the key to overcoming obstacles lies in maintaining professionalism, setting clear boundaries, and cultivating mutual respect, especially in a male-dominated environment where growth and adaptation are constant.

In navigating her career, she has participated in numerous local and international courses and programmes, including the International Principal Warfare Officer (IPWO) Course at HMS Collingwood in the United Kingdom in 2023 and the Women in Maritime Security (WIMS) Programme at the University of Wollongong in Australia in 2024 – further demonstrating her unwavering commitment to professional growth and naval excellence.

In addition to her operational and leadership roles, she has also been entrusted with ceremonial duties, including leading the Guard of Honour during the visit of Vice Admiral Ronald Joseph S. Mercado, Flag Officerin-Command of the Philippine Navy, to the RBN in 2017. She was also appointed as the Commander for the Royal Brunei Armed Forces (RBAF) women's contingent during the 33rd and 40th National Day celebrations in the same year (2017) as well as last year.

Whether ashore or underway, she ensures time to destress and stay active – a reflection of the discipline and

balance expected of today's naval officers. She regularly goes for walks, both within and outside of camp, and enjoys horse riding at the RBAF Saddle Club in Berakas Camp as a way to unwind and maintain resilience amidst her demanding duties. Beyond her professional role, she also embraces leadership in the sporting arena, having served as team manager for Hokage Warriors, a local netball team, who were crowned champions of the Brunei Netball League in 2022.

As the RBN continues to evolve, Lieutenant Commander Nazurah, RBN, hopes her journey inspires more young men and women to step forward in service. "The Navy has given me purpose, growth, and pride in serving my country. I encourage others, especially young women, to believe in themselves, take the leap, and contribute to something bigger than themselves."

Now serving as the RBN Principal Warfare Officer (PWO) at the Fleet Headquarters, her journey embodies grit, determination, leadership, and steadfast national service. Her story stands as a testament to the growing opportunities within the RBN for those with courage, conviction, and commitment. As she continues to break waves and barriers, Lieutenant Commander Nazurah, RBN, stands as an inspiring role model for future generations, reminding us that the sea holds a place for everyone who dares to rise to the challenge, regardless of gender.

As she looks ahead from the Fleet HQ, she keeps one line close from novelist Nora Roberts: "If you don't go after what you want, you'll never have it. If you don't ask, the answer is always no. If you don't step forward, you're always in the same place" — a reminder to ask boldly, step forward, and never stand still.

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# 80 Years On: Remembering the Bravery Behind Brunei's Liberation

ighty years ago, Brunei Darussalam's shores bore witness not to peace, but to war. The tranquil Brunei Bay, now patrolled by our Navy, once echoed with the thunder of naval bombardments and landing craft during Operation OBOE VI, launched on 10 June 1945 by the Australian 9th Division with U.S. and British naval support. The objective was twofold: to liberate Brunei from Japanese occupation and to secure Brunei Bay as a forward fleet base for the British Pacific Fleet. Brunei's oil and rubber reserves made it a strategically vital target and the operation was carefully orchestrated to regain control of these resources while enabling further Allied operations in Southeast Asia.

Brunei had endured four years of hardship under Japanese rule, marked by forced labour and repression. The Allied landings at Muara and Labuan, followed by advances into Brunei Town, Tutong, Limbang, and Kuala Belait, were swift but hardfought—especially in "The Pocket," a heavily fortified jungle area on Labuan where entrenched Japanese

troops held out for days before being overwhelmed. Indigenous Dayak fighters, with their deep knowledge of the land, played a crucial role through guerrilla tactics that disrupted Japanese movements and supported the liberation effort.

The cost of freedom was steep, paid through the courage of Allied troops and local resistance. Their sacrifice not only restored Brunei's sovereignty but transformed Brunei Bay into a critical Allied anchorage.

On 12 June 2025, the Royal Brunei Navy commemorated this historic victory at the "Saksi Sejarah: 80 Years On - Remembering Operation OBOE" exhibition hosted by the Australian High Commission at Dermaga Diraja. Led by RBN Deputy Commander Captain Khairil bin Haji Abdul Rahman, RBN, and accompanied by the Australian Defence Adviser Lieutenant Colonel Paul Sanderson, the RBN delegation reflected on artifacts and wartime relics — including an original 25-pounder shell box honouring those who fought for Brunei's freedom.

For today's Bruneian sailors, Operation OBOE VI is more than history — it is the reason they serve. As the officers moved through the exhibition, surrounded by echoes of the past, they were reminded that their service today is an extension

of a legacy forged through sacrifice. They do not sail alone; they sail in the wake of those who fought to give Brunei its future. Their mission — ensuring maritime security, defending national waters and upholding peace — is rooted in the very struggle that brought freedom ashore in 1945.

We honour those who came ashore. We remember those who never returned. Because of them — we are free. Because of them — we serve.

# Fleet Reviews: Honouring the Sea, Uniting the Fleet

A timeless tradition showcasing unity, readiness and naval prestige on the world stage.



A dazzling display of fireworks and ship illuminations lights up the night during the Coronation Fleet Review for Queen Elizabeth II. With warships glowing from stem to stern and the sky ablaze, this spectacle at Spithead celebrated not just a new monarch — but the enduring pageantry and pride of the Royal Navy.

here is a deep, almost sacred resonance to the sight of a naval fleet assembled in formation — warships stretched across the water in solemn order, their national ensigns fluttering proudly in the wind. Sailors stand motionless at their stations, uniforms immaculate, while the reviewing vessel glides past to the sound of saluting guns and bugle calls. This is the fleet review — a ceremony steeped in maritime tradition, rich in symbolism and as relevant to the modern navy as it was centuries ago.

## Centuries of Ceremony and Seapower

The tradition of fleet reviews reaches back nearly seven centuries. One of the earliest recorded events took place in 1346, when King Edward III of England reviewed his ships before departing for the Battle of Crécy. These early reviews served both practical and symbolic purposes: they were a means to assess fleet readiness, project military power, and instill a sense of unity and morale among sailors.

Bythe 19th and early 20th centuries, fleet reviews had evolved into elaborate national spectacles. Spithead, the anchorage off Portsmouth, became synonymous with these grand gatherings, held to mark coronations, royal jubilees, and major wartime transitions. Notable among them was the Coronation Review for Queen Elizabeth II in 1953, which featured over 300 ships from the Commonwealth and allied nations. It was a powerful display of seapower and unity, highlighting the navy's role in defence and diplomacy.

## Beyond the Salute: The Strategic Theatre of Fleet Reviews

Though rooted in royal and wartime traditions, today's fleet reviews serve broader and more diverse functions. At their core, they remain a demonstration of naval readiness and discipline. Every formation, manoeuvre, and salute is a testament to the training and coordination that underpin effective seapower.

When a navy invites foreign vessels to participate in a review, it is not merely a ceremonial courtesy — it is an act of trust and cooperation. Such events offer an opportunity for navies to interact on neutral waters, share best practices, and reinforce multilateral relationships. For the host nation, the review becomes a platform to signal its commitment to maritime peace and security.

#### The Orchestration of Naval Honour

A fleet review is a highly coordinated event, beginning with warships assembling in precise formation, decks readied, and flags flying. As the reviewing authority — often a head of state or commander — approaches, the fleet prepares to render honours.

The reviewing ship passes between the lines as sailors stand in silent salute, naval guns fire, and aircraft may perform overhead tributes. At night, ships are often illuminated in unison, a tradition dating back to 19th-century Spithead Reviews. The ceremony typically concludes with receptions, ship tours, and joint exercises.

# Carrying Heritage into the Currents of Today

Fleet reviews are more than symbolic gestures — they are rituals that bind sailors across generations and borders. These grand maritime gatherings connect us to a long-standing legacy of naval excellence while reinforcing values of unity, readiness, and service. In an age of evolving maritime threats and complex partnerships, such traditions remind us that the strength of a navy lies not only in its firepower but also in its ability to represent a nation with dignity and pride on the world stage.

For the Royal Brunei Navy, participating in fleet reviews has become a meaningful avenue to cement our stature among global maritime peers. In 2011, the RBN proudly hosted a fleet review of its own as part of the Brunei Darussalam International Defence Exhibition (BRIDEX) — a historic moment that showcased Brunei's commitment to maritime diplomacy and brought regional and international vessels to our shores. More recently, in November 2022, KDB DARULEHSAN made RBN's inaugural deployment to Japan's 18th Western Pacific Naval Symposium (WPNS) and International Fleet Review in Yokosuka.

These engagements raise RBN's profile, enhance interoperability, and affirm our credibility as a professional and dependable force. Though modest in size, RBN stands tall — embodying honour, professionalism, and enduring dedication.
